In terms of staffing, we are fully staffed for September and have made some exciting additions to strengthen our team. I am passionate about seeing Performing Arts flourish at our school, and I am already looking forward to both the Christmas Concert and the Collaboration Concert later this month.

As part of our planning for next year, we will be making some changes to the school day. I will share full details in a separate letter. LITERARY LOUNGE TRIP TO WATERSTONES



Sam, Year 8, also chose a book related to science:

'I chose 'Parallel Worlds' by Machio Kaku because I was drawn to the name and it made me want to find out if there is another planet with life that hasn't been discovered. This book is absolutely impossible to overlook; it's mindblowing!'

Jiro, Year 9, chose to read 'The Book of Bill' by Alex Hirsch because he is a member of the fandom the book is related to:

'It falls into the genre of fantasy / mystery, and it breaks the fourth wall. It is also interactive, with many codes that you need to decipher to find secrets and has funny and horrifying images which make it really appealing.'

The boys hope to swap their books when they have finished so that they have the opportunity to read twelve different books they perhaps wouldn't have considered previously. On Thursday 22 May, regular attendees of the Literary Lounge, who topped the leader board for achieving 'Bibliophile', 'Voracious Reader' and 'Literary Lounge Legend' status, were taken to Waterstones, Liverpool, to select a book to take home and read.

Twelve students from Years 7, 8, and 9 spent a joyous afternoon perusing the Young Adult, History and Science sections, choosing books which reveal their love of specific genres and reflect their diverse interests, hobbies and talents.

Lawrence, Year 8, chose the book 'On the Origin of Time' by Thomas Hertog: 'I chose this book because science interests me and I like to learn about the world. This book is about quantum physics: the body of scientific laws that describe the wacky behaviour of photons, electrons and the other subatomic particles that make up the universe. It is also about black holes and the Big Bang.'

We extended this sessions to the vocalists from Dixons Fazakerley and Dixons Broadgreen to help prepare for our collaboration concert in July. As all three schools will be singing together in celebration of the Liverpool Heritage having a theme of the 'Beatles'. It was really something to hear over 50 voices singing together from the three schools.

All three schools will also feature soloists at the event as well as coming together in collaboration to sing a Medley of Beatles songs.

Pupils worked well together and are looking forward to further rehearsals and the event on the 14th July.

TALKING TEENS

The Centre of Emotional Health has developed a 4-week course focusing on relationships, communication and brain development. Sessions last for 2 hours and this will run once a week for 4 weeks for parents.

The programme consists of four sessions, developed with Dr John Coleman, to increase parents' understanding of teenagers' feelings and behaviour, and deliver key strategies for maintaining and improving relationships. Based on the most recent research on adolescence, and consistent with the principles of the Nurturing Programme

Key topics:

- Exploring the importance of parents for teenagers
- Developing parents' understanding of teenage development and the influence of brain development on behaviour
- Developing parents' understanding of the importance of listening, verbal and non-verbal communication
- Promoting positive approaches to boundary setting and problemsolving
- Providing an opportunity for parents to share their experience with others

HOME LEARNING AT DIXONS CROXTETH

At Dixons Croxteth Academy, we build a partnership between carers, students, and teachers that puts learning first. We help our students value learning by teaching them to take ownership of their own success. Home learning activities play a significant role in a pupil's educational journey and wider development.

Why is Home Learning so Important?

When our long-term memory is altered, we have learnt something. However, when we are exposed to new information, we instantly begin to forget it. Over time, the amount of original information retained significantly reduces unless it is revisited often.

Our home learning strategy is designed to allow students to frequently revisit powerful knowledge, interrupting the forgetting process.

There are three strands to our Home Learning Strategy:

Read. Cover. Write. Check. (RCWC): This is a paper-based task. Sparx Maths: Online. Seneca Learning: Online.

Expectations – Y7 and Y8

Up to 60 minutes per day of: Seneca Sparx Maths RCWC

Expectations – Y9 and Y10

Up to 90 minutes per day of: Seneca Sparx Maths RCWC Completion of past GCSE examination questions

Expectations – Y11

A minimum of 90 minutes per day of: Seneca Sparx Maths RCWC Completion of past GCSE examination questions Accessing revision sites
