



CULTURE OF ERROR

On Friday 12th September, we welcomed teaching colleagues into the academy for a focused review of teaching and learning in Science. It was a brilliant day where academy leaders immersed themselves in lessons, observed classroom practice, questioned students, and gained a deeper insight into what is really happening in our classrooms.

One particularly interesting observation was how quickly teachers responded when students gave incorrect answers or said they didn't know. While well-intentioned, this instinct can unintentionally discourage risk-taking. We must move away from this. At Dixons Croxteth, we want our students to build resilience in their learning and understand that it's OK to get it wrong.

We use the metaphor of climbing a mountain to describe the learning journey. At times, we all need support to climb our own mountain – and each mountain looks different for every student. From a teaching and learning perspective, we'll be doing lots of work with staff around the idea of a Culture of Error. For this to thrive, we need safe and secure learning environments, and an atmosphere of support from both teachers and peers.




This is a really exciting time at Dixons Croxteth, and we're proud to be building a culture where mistakes are seen not as setbacks, but as stepping stones to success.

CITIZENS UK



Last week, a group of our students took part in a Citizens UK training session to learn how communities create positive change.

They discovered that true leadership is about listening, including others, and empowering people to act, not just giving instructions. The workshop inspired them to think about local issues, from the environment to neighbourhood support and how they can bring people together to make a difference.



CORRECTIONS AT DIXONS CROXTETH A POSITIVE APPROACH TO BEHAVIOUR

At Dixons Croxteth, we believe in high expectations and a culture of continuous improvement. When a student breaks one of our six learning habits, we don't view it as a failure, but as an opportunity to reflect and grow. Our approach is rooted in the key question we ask all students:

"How will I be better tomorrow than I was today?"

What is a Correction?

A correction is a short, purposeful intervention designed to help students reflect on their behaviour and make better choices moving forward. It is not a punishment, but a chance to reset and improve.

20 minutes for breaking 1 learning habit40 minutes for breaking 2 learning habits60 minutes for breaking 3 or more learning habits

We aim to complete corrections on the same day so that the behaviour is fresh in the student's mind and they can meaningfully reflect on how to improve.

Our Approach

- No corrections were issued during the first week of term, as we gave all students a reset period after the summer break.
- Due to a delay in communication, corrections are only now being implemented. We appreciate your understanding and support as we embed this system.
- Corrections are not negative they are a positive step towards accountability and growth.
- Every day is a fresh start. We do not hold grudges.

Why Your Support Matters

We ask for your full support if your child receives a correction. Removing a child from a correction undermines the three-way partnership between school, student, and family. Together, we can help your child succeed.

A Helpful Analogy

Think of it like speeding in a car. Most of us try to stick to the 30mph limit, but occasionally, we might unintentionally go slightly over. If we're caught doing 34mph, it's frustrating – but we accept the consequence and adjust our behaviour. Corrections work the same way: they help students recognise when they've gone off track and give them the tools to get back on.

ACADEMY BREAKFAST



We are delighted to share the continued success of our Friday Breakfast initiative at Dixons Croxteth. As part of our commitment to student wellbeing, we offer a free breakfast every day in the canteen from 7:45am.

From Monday to Thursday, students can enjoy:

- · Bagels and toast
- · Cereal and fruit

To make Fridays a more joyful occasion, we provide a cooked breakfast for all staff and students. This includes:

- · Bacon or sausage sandwiches
 - · Eggs and tomatoes
- · Vegetarian and halal options
- · Cereal and fruit still available

Due to the high number of students accessing breakfast on Fridays, we are adjusting the timing slightly to ensure a smooth start to the day. Friday breakfast will now be served from 7:30am to 8:10am. Students may continue eating until 8:15am, but service will stop at 8:10am.

HATE CRIME MONTH OF ACTION

HATE CRIME

Over the coming month, Merseyside Police Safer Schools Officers and school staff will be delivering assemblies and classroom sessions focusing on Hate Crime. This initiative aims to help pupils understand what hate crime is, how it affects individuals and communities, and what they can do if they experience or witness it.



Topics covered in session

- · Understanding what constitutes a hate crime
- Protected characteristics and their importance
- Online hate crime recognising abusive or threatening behaviour on social media, gaming platforms, or messaging apps, and understanding its consequences
- · What to do if targeted online
- · How to report hate crime

IF YOUR CHILD EXPERIENCES ONLINE HATE

- Block the person or people responsible on all platforms
- Keep evidence take screenshots, save messages, and note dates/times
- Report the abuse to the social media or online platform where it occurred
- Tell a trusted adult such as a parent, teacher, or youth worker
- Report to police if the behaviour is threatening, abusive, or otherwise criminal



What is a Hate Crime?

A hate crime is any criminal offence motivated by hostility or prejudice towards a person's:

- · Race or ethnicity
- · Religion or belief
- Sexual orientation
- Disability
- Gender identity

These are known as protected characteristics under LIK law

Examples of Hate Crime

Hate crimes can happen in person or online and can include:

- · Verbal or physical abuse
- · Intimidation and threats
- Criminal damage
- Harassment
- · Incitement to hate

Example: If someone is verbally abused in the street because of their religion, or receives threatening messages online because of their disability, this would be classed as a hate crime

TO KNOW ABOUT

This list is not exhaustive, and will be updated each year to reflect new risks and dangers

THESE APPS CAN EASILY BE USED AS GROOMING TOOLS BY ONLINE PREDATORS LOOKING TO MEET UP & SEXUALLY ABUSE CHILDREN. (UPDATED 2021)



FACEBOOK



FACEBOOK allows you to connect with others and share comments, photos and videos. You can add friends, write on people's pages and posts, join groups and play games.

SNAPCHAT



SNAPCHAT is one of the most popular apps in recent years. Whilst the app promises that photo's, videos and stories disappear, others can take screenshots of private photo's.

INSTAGRAM



INSTAGRAM Kids are creating fake accounts to hide content from their parents, according to police. Messages are also deleted once a user leaves a conversation.

WHATSAPP



WHATSAPP allows you to send messages, images and videos in 121 and group chats with your contacts. You can choose to share your live location for up to eight hours with one contact or a group.

KIDSCHAT



KIDSCHAT.NET is a free online messaging app for children. You can talk to people you don't know on public forums and via private message. You can access the site as a guest.

SKYPE



SKYPE is a platform and app that lets you make audio and video calls to other people around the world. You can also send instant messages.

WHISPER



WHISPER is an anonymous social media app that promotes sharing personal secrets with strangers, (new people). It reveals a users location so people can meet up

CALCULATOR %



CALCULATOR % is only one of SEVERAL social media apps disguised as a calculator, the app is actually a secret photo vault to hide photos, videos, files and browser history.

HOT ON NOT



HOT ON NOT Strangers rate a user's 'attractiveness' with the aim of real-world meet ups in your local area.

ASK.FM



ASK.FM An app where users can anonymously ask questions and receive answers. The app has been featured in a number of cyber bullying cases.

YUBO



YUBO Similar to Tinder, the app is designed to allow teens to flirt with each other.

KIK MESSAGING KIK



KIK MESSAGING Kik is a messaging app that allows content normally filtered on a home computer.

BURN BOOK



BURN BOOK Anonymous rumours can be posted about people through audio messages, texts and photos.

WISHBONE



WISHBONE This app allows users to compare kids and rate them on a scale.

GRINDR



GRINDR is a dating app geared towards gay, bisexual and transgender people. The app allows people to chat, share and meet up in person based on a GPSS location.

SKOUT



SKOUT is a location based dating app and website. Whilst people under 17 are unable to share private photo's, Children can easily create fake accounts.

MEET ME



MEET ME is a dating social media app that allows users to connect with people based on geographic proximity. The app encourages people to meet in person.

TIK TOK



TIK TOK is one of the most popular apps in recent years used for sharing short videos with very limited privacy controls users are vulnerable to explicit material.

TELLOYMN



TELLOYMN anonymous messenger app. It calls itself "the most honest place on the internet." Age controls are inconsistent and sexual explicit material can be found.

Zoomerang



Zoomerang is a popular app that looks like a harmless messaging app however it allows private anonymous messaging and is location enabled.

BUMBLE



BUMBLE is a location based dating app and website. Whilst people under 17 are unable to share private photo's, Children can easily create fake accounts

FACEBOOK MESSENGER



FACEBOOK MESSENGER

Is one of the most popular message apps in the world. It has already heavily been used by predators and the end-to end encryption will make it even more unsafe.

BADOO



BADOO is a location based dating app and website. Whilst people under 17 are unable to share private photo's, Children can easily create fake accounts.

OMEGLE



OMEGLE is a video chat website where users are matched randomly with strangers.

HOME LEARNING AT DIXONS CROXTETH

At Dixons Croxteth Academy, we build a partnership between carers, students, and teachers that puts learning first. We help our students value learning by teaching them to take ownership of their own success. Home learning activities play a significant role in a pupil's educational journey and wider development.

Why is Home Learning so Important?

When our long-term memory is altered, we have learnt something. However, when we are exposed to new information, we instantly begin to forget it. Over time, the amount of original information retained significantly reduces unless it is revisited often.

Our home learning strategy is designed to allow students to frequently revisit powerful knowledge, interrupting the forgetting process.

There are three strands to our Home Learning Strategy:

Read. Cover. Write. Check. (RCWC): This is a paper-based task. Sparx Maths: Online.
Seneca Learning: Online.

Expectations – Y7 and Y8

Up to 60 minutes per day of: Seneca Sparx Maths RCWC

Expectations – Y9 and Y10

Up to 90 minutes per day of: Seneca Sparx Maths RCWC Completion of past GCSE examination questions

Expectations - Y11

A minimum of 90 minutes per day of:
Seneca
Sparx Maths
